Re: **Administrative Report for the Week Ending February 21, 2020**

ADMINISTRATION

1. Clerk and election staff administered the 2020 Spring Primary Election on Tuesday, February 18, 2020; voter turnout was at 32.61%. Thank you to all of Fox Point's wonderful Chief Inspectors, Election Inspectors and DPW for a job well done.
2. On February 20, 2020, "A" Ballots were sent out to all permanent overseas, temporary overseas, and military voters on file on for the 2020 Spring Election and Presidential Preference Primary.
3. Absentee Ballot listings were generated, created for both poll locations and printed for the 2020 Spring Primary on Tuesday by the clerk's office.
4. 2020 Spring Primary Election results were secured, reconciled and taken by staff to the Milwaukee County Election Commission.
5. Wisconsin Voter Registration Applications and Wisconsin Absentee Ballot Request Applications continue to consistently stream into the clerk's office for the 2020 election year; applications are processed and filed by staff.
6. Voter participation for each poll location is currently being entered into WisVote by the clerk's office.
7. Village Manager participated in North Shore Manager's meeting, hosted by Bayside.

DEPARTMENT OF PUBLIC WORKS

1. Water utility staff repaired a leaking valve on a 12-inch main on Yates Road near the entrance to Cardinal Stritch. They are also monitoring a possible leak near Beach Court and may call in a locator to verify whether there is a leak.
2. Water utility staff also updated the GIS database, worked with Azura's contractor on the 3-inch meter installation specifications, and attended a lunch and learn.
3. DPW staff have been busy with sewer cleaning, responded to a snow event on Monday, and performing ward and renewal pruning.
4. In the shop, the mechanic is finalizing the specs for our new pieces of equipment (tandem, pickup and dump truck), performed PM's, and received quotes for the replacement of the lift station generator.
5. Staff conducted interviews with six different consultants for the Lake Drive resurfacing project. The design activities will begin this summer and will extend over the next three

years with construction of the road to occur in either 2024 or 2025 (depends on available budget in 2024). Water main work may be done prior to the road work or as part of the overall construction.

POLICE DEPARTMENT

1. Staff conducted department-wide training to receive updates to mandatory topics and introduction to a new mental health and well-being program.
2. Officers responded to Best Buy for a report of a retail theft which resulted in the arrest of the subject after they concealed merchandise in the store.
3. Officers responded to Saint Eugene's school after administration reported vandalism had occurred during the evening / weekend hours.
4. Officers responded to assist Glendale police after a pursuit and vehicle crash which resulted in the occupants fleeing on foot. All of the occupants were located and arrested by Glendale police.
5. Officers responded to assist security at Cardinal Stritch college with a visitor who was on campus and acting disorderly. The subject left the building prior to police arrival.
6. Sergeant Morelli hosted a Coffee with a Cop event at the Friendship Circle bakery. The event provided an opportunity for citizens to meet with officers and ask questions.

Did you know?

February is Heart Month, the perfect time to learn about your risk for heart disease and the steps you could take now to help your heart. Heart disease—and the conditions that lead to it—can happen at any age. High rates of obesity and high blood pressure among younger people (ages 35-64) are putting them at risk for heart disease earlier in life. According to the Center for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC), half of all Americans have at least one of the top three risk factors for heart disease (high blood pressure, high cholesterol, and smoking).

The below conditions and behaviors that put all people at risk for heart disease are appearing at younger ages:

- **High blood pressure (HBP).** Millions of Americans of all ages have high blood pressure, including millions of people in their 40s and 50s. About half of people with high blood pressure don't have it under control. Having uncontrolled high blood pressure is one of the biggest risks for heart disease and other harmful conditions, such as stroke. - **High blood cholesterol.** High cholesterol can increase the risk for heart disease. Having diabetes and obesity, smoking, eating unhealthy foods, and not getting enough physical activity can all contribute to unhealthy cholesterol levels. - **Smoking.** More than 37 million U.S. adults are current smokers, and thousands of young people start smoking each day. Smoking damages the blood vessels and can cause heart disease. If you do smoke, call the *Wisconsin Tobacco Quit Line*. This is a free service to help people quit smoking, vaping, or other tobacco use.
