Re: **Administrative Report for the Week Ending October 29, 2021**

ADMINISTRATION

1. Clerk's office prepared, mailed to interested parties, and posted special assessment public hearing notices as required pursuant to state statutes.
2. Municipal discussion of GCS conversion concerns and questions was attended by Treasurer and Accounting Financial Manager on Tuesday afternoon.
3. Treasurer and Accounting Financial Manager attended LandNav (accounting software) Phase I Conversion Training on Thursday.
4. Redistricting Maps have not yet been approved for Milwaukee County; two maps will be presented at the Milwaukee County Board of Supervisors today; the meeting begins at 1:00 p.m. The Village Clerk continues to follow updates.
5. Plan Commission meeting agenda and packet was prepared, posted and distributed for the meeting on November 1, 2021 at 5:45 p.m.
6. Village Manager attended North Shore Manager's meeting.
7. Assistant Manager is in process of uploading previous recordings of board and commission meetings to the Village website.

DEPARTMENT OF PUBLIC WORKS

1. Staff participated in a walk through with All-Ways to discuss the 2021 Road and Utility and Greenvale projects and any minor items that remain to be completed. Most of the work is completed but it is noted that portions of the Greenvale basin will be reseeded (from the top of the berm toward the outside edge). The area within the basin will be monitored as it was planted with a prairie mix and it may take as much as three to four years before it is fully established.
2. As noted last week, staff received proposals from three consultants for the 2022 Road and Utility project (anticipated to be Bradley, Wye and Port Washington) and will make a recommendation to the Board at the November meeting. The proposals were for approximately \$55,000, \$68,000 and \$218,000.
3. In the shop:

- a. The mechanics received word that our replacement for truck 4 will not be delivered until next year (late winter or later) and staff will be meeting with the vendor to discuss delivery concerns.
 - b. The garbage scooters are scheduled to be delivered in the next couple of weeks.
 - c. Trucks 5 and 11 are having problems with their after-treatment devices (which were required to be installed to reduce emissions from the trucks) and they are working on the appropriate repairs.
4. In DPW:
 - a. Staff continues to be busy with normal activities. Yard waste has been particularly heavy in light of the strong winds this past Monday. However, there weren't many reports of tree damage from the winds.
 - b. Staff is also stump grinding, pruning, continuing with leaf collections, and have been busy with Pavilion rentals, block parties, and the Fox Point Foundation Halloween party.
5. In water utility:
 - a. Staff met with Crane Engineering which diagnosed the problem with the pumps.
 - b. Staff met with the contractor for the work at Fox Point Lutheran regarding their water main tie in. They will be cutting into Calumet Road to provide a new main/service to the ROW and a service in toward the church for fire flow protection.
 - c. Staff has also been busy with locates, met with Core Pro regarding the corrosion protection inspection and have investigated high bill complaints.
6. Asplundh is still performing line trimming and it appears the work is going quite well.
7. Staff met with Kapur regarding the projects wrapping up this year and those to be done in 2022.
8. Staff worked with our consultant (MSA) to prepare the quarterly report and reimbursement request for the Beach Drive Coastal Resiliency Project and sent the information to Wisconsin Emergency Management.

POLICE DEPARTMENT

1. Officers responded to a report of a disabled vehicle after a car drove off the road and was stuck in the ditch. The officer's investigation revealed the driver was operating while impaired by alcohol and prescription medication. The driver was arrested and subsequently transported to the hospital for evaluation after experiencing altered levels of consciousness. The case will be heard in the municipal court.
2. Officers responded to a request for assistance from Whitefish Bay police who were involved in an extended vehicle pursuit. The Fox Point officer deployed Stop-Sticks to render the vehicle inoperable. The driver was arrested by Whitefish Bay officers.
3. Officers responded to CVS Pharmacy after a customer reported that their wallet was taken while they were shopping. The customer lost cash, credit cards and identification documents during the theft. The investigation is open as the officer reviews surveillance and interviews witnesses.
4. Officers conducted a traffic stop for an equipment violation which resulted in the arrest of the driver for possession of marijuana. The driver will appear in the municipal court.

5. Chief Freedy participated in a recognition for First Responders Recognition Day held by the Milwaukee County Sheriff's Office and the Light the Hoan group. The bridge was lit with different colors representing the various first responder groups.
6. Officers conducted follow-up interviews with a subject in custody at Whitefish Bay for a retail theft with similar circumstances to an open Fox Point case.
7. Officers responded for a family trouble call after a 14-year-old was being disruptive and argumentative with a grandparent. The situation was de-escalated and resolved without arrest or further police involvement.
8. Court Clerk McKenzie attended the Court Clerks conference and annual training held by the Wisconsin Supreme Court.

NSHD Healthy Highlight 10/26/21: October 24 to October 30 is National Lead Poisoning Prevention Week

It's Childhood Lead Poisoning Prevention Week, and kids run better unleaded! Be sure your kids are tested for lead.

- Lead is toxic to humans and animals and using it in products that adults or children can access can cause lead poisoning.
- Lead poisoning can cause brain damage.
- Lead poisoning can result in reduced IQ, attention span, learning disabilities, developmental delays, and many other health impacts.
- Lead is an element that naturally occurs and can be found in small amounts in the Earth's crust.
- In the past, it was mined in Wisconsin and used to stabilize many products like paint, gas, and plastics.
- As a housing -based disease, lead poisoning exposures for young children are greatest in homes built before 1978. It was banned from being added to paint and varnish in homes after 1978 but may still be present in underlying layers of paint and varnish and in the soil.
