Re: Administrative Report for the Week Ending April 15, 2022

ADMINISTRATION

1. Staff facilitated the Village Board meeting on April 12, 2022.

- 2. Staff facilitated the Building Board meeting on April 13, 2022.
- 3. Repairs to the Board Room AV system were made on April 14, 2022.
- 4. Clerk and Deputy Clerk completed the Municipal Board of Canvas Monday certifying the Election Results from April 5. Total votes cast for Village Trustee 3,041; Elizabeth Aelion 1,244, Bill Kravit 857, and Eric Fonstad 944.
- 5. Staff and President Frazer facilitated and hosted ICC meeting on April 11, 2022.
- 6. Staff met with representatives of Associated Bank.
- 7. Village Manager participated in monthly North Shore Water Commission meeting.
- 8. Assistant Manager met with representatives from CivicPlus regarding the Village's website redesign process.

DEPARTMENT OF PUBLIC WORKS

- 1. Staff received notification from North Shore Water that they were still seeing a large amount of water usage (above and beyond normal usage) since January. Staff discussed possible root cause scenarios and the water department staff drove around the Village looking for leaks. When walking around the retention basin on Port Washington Road near Indian Creek, they found that there was quite a bit of water exiting the basin even though there had not been any rain for a few days. They grabbed a water sample and found chlorine in the water so they called in a leak correlator, pinpointed the leak on Port Washington Road, and made the repair on Thursday. This leak went unnoticed as it emptied into Milwaukee County's storm sewer, into the basin and then into Indian Creek which runs under I-43 and into River Hills.
- 2. DPW staff have been busy with stump grinding, regular activities, yard waste collections and other miscellaneous tasks.
- 3. The Forester and Foreman have begun placing stakes where new trees are to be planted and the Forester has met with residents about the trees to be planted.
- 4. Staff met with Baxter & Woodman regarding the Bradley Road project including the proposed layout and elevations of the road and proposed path. Staff has been fielding

- many questions about the road mainly from residents who are still opposed to the incorporation of a path.
- 5. Staff completed the quarterly report for the Beach Drive Coastal Resiliency Project. Based on conversations with the State, it appears we are able to be reimbursed for force labor costs (at a rate of 75% of our costs to date of roughly \$18,000). Staff put together documentation and time sheets for the State to review when issuing the reimbursement.
- 6. Staff also sent another request to one of the property owners on Beach regarding the proposed project and had a conversation with a second property owner regarding the proposed revetment.

POLICE DEPARTMENT

- 1. Officers responded to Best Buy for a report of a retail theft after two subjects removed electronics without permission or payment. The subject's vehicle was located by Glendale officers and three occupants were taken into custody for felony retail theft. Additionally, two of the subjects held felony warrants for prior offenses. The subjects were also wanted for questioning by multiple agencies for other incidents of retail thefts at Best Buy and Target stores. The three subjects were transported to the Milwaukee County Justice Facility pending charges from the Milwaukee County District Attorney's Office.
- 2. An officer attempted to conduct a traffic stop for a registration and equipment violation, however the vehicle accelerated away without stopping. The officer engaged in a short pursuit, but terminated due to excessive speeds and reckless driving behavior of the fleeing subject. Attempts to identify the driver are on-going.
- 3. Officers observed a disabled vehicle and subsequently arrested the driver for an outstanding warrant through the Ozaukee County Sheriff's Department. The driver was later turned over to the requesting agency to satisfy the warrant.
- 4. Fox Point officers assisted Glendale police with a scene perimeter after a pursuit came to an end on Port Washington Road and the vehicle occupants fled. Three subjects were taken into custody.
- 5. A resident reported an identity theft after a subject gained access to their email account and attempted to access funds from a life insurance policy with forged documents. Investigation is on-going.
- 6. Mutual aid was provided to Glendale police who were pursuing burglary suspects. Fox Point officers maintained the integrity of a burglary scene and subsequent motor vehicle accident scene while subjects were apprehended by surrounding departments providing assistance.
- 7. Staff conducted evacuation and reunification training for area schools.
- 8. Staff attended a planning meeting for the North Shore National Night Out scheduled for August 2022.
- 9. Staff conducted meetings with other North Shore agencies on emergency response plans.

Caring adults in the life of children and adolescents can impact and influence choices made, particularly about underage drinking. Think kids won't listen? Think again.

- A lack of interest in their appearance or favorite activities.
- Memory lapses and poor concentration or coordination.

Signs of drinking like...

- The smell of alcohol.
- Hangover symptoms, like bloodshot eyes.
- Alcohol missing from your home or finding alcohol in hidden places, like a closet or backpack.
- Hanging out with friends that use alcohol or other substances.

Underage drinking can affect how kids' brains develop. Alcohol damages areas responsible for learning, memory, and more.
